


Welcome

Set in the beautiful grounds of Wimpole Hall with its impressive mansion, parkland, gardens and farm, the Wimpole History Festival Schools' Day is a hugely exciting treat for Key Stage 2 pupils. With an array of top-notch history writers and interactive author readings, this day aligns perfectly with the National Curriculum History Programme of Study.

Wimpole History Festival Schools' Day inspires the pupils' curiosity, prompts historical enquiry, develops knowledge of the past, contributes to cultural capital, and will be a truly enjoyable and memorable day!

What is the cost and how do we book tickets?

The cost is £10 per pupil and staff members are free. You can make a booking by completing the Booking Form included on page 6 of this programme. Once completed, please email it to info@cambridgeliteraryfestival.com.

Is there a maximum capacity for groups?

No maximum capacity.

How many teachers should accompany the group?

For year all year groups (3-4 & 5-6) we require a minimum adult-to-student ratio of 1:10.*

Can pupils buy books at the festival?

Yes, pupils can buy books. Once schools have booked, we will send a list of the books and the prices.

Do we book for the whole day or just one event at a time?

Bookings are for the whole day of events (three events plus a lunch break).

Are the events accessible?

Yes, our venues are wheelchair accessible. If a student has specific requirements please get in touch at info@cambridgeliteraryfestival.com.

What should we bring?

Please bring clipboards for each student, writing pencils and some colouring pencils/crayons if possible.

What are the plans for lunch?

Pupils must bring their own packed lunch. These can be eaten outside in the grounds during lunch break. If we have bad weather, lunch can be eaten inside the event marquees.

Is there anywhere we can buy tea and coffee?

Yes. The Old Rectory Restaurant is next to the festival and there is a café in the Stable Block.

Where should we park?

There is parking on site for coaches in the car park near the Stable Block.

*Adults additional to the ratio of 1:10 must be paid for.

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


Chae Strathie


Lucy Coats

2-3pm




Tony Bradman


Christopher Lloyd
